



Katherine Child Aware Local Plan

Child Aware Local Initiative is a capacity-building initiative which supports communities to undertake early intervention and prevention activities that contribute to keeping children safe and well.

Child Aware Local Initiative is a central priority under the *National Framework for Protecting Australia's Children 2009-2020* and the *Second Action Plan 2012-15*. Endorsed by the Council of Australian Governments, the National Framework represents an unprecedented level of collaboration between Australian, State and Territory governments and non-government organisations to protect children. The Child Aware Local Initiative is implemented through partnerships between the community sector, Commonwealth, State and Territory governments.

The six supporting outcomes of the National Framework are key drivers to the initiative:

1. Children live in safe and supportive families and communities
2. Children and families access adequate support to promote safety and intervene early
3. Risk factors for child abuse and neglect are addressed
4. Children who have been abused or neglected receive the support and care they need for their safety and well being
5. Indigenous children are supported and safe in their families and communities
6. Child sexual abuse and exploitation is prevented and survivors receive adequate support

Key messages of the Child Aware Local Initiative:

Protecting children is everyone's business.

- ▶ Children have a right to be safe, valued and cared for.
- ▶ The best way to protect children is to prevent abuse and neglect from happening in the first place.
- ▶ Children and families should have a 'voice' in decisions affecting their lives.
- ▶ Governments, communities, organisations and individuals can work together to improve outcomes for vulnerable children and families.
- ▶ Children are usually best supported within their families.
- ▶ A 'one size fits all' approach does not work across Australia's diverse communities.
- ▶ Local solutions are required for local problems.
- ▶ Culturally diverse groups need culturally sensitive responses

Our vision for a Child Aware community in Katherine

“The children of Katherine are happy, healthy and safe, and have every opportunity for a fulfilling future.”

CALI Katherine Aims to:

Develop strategies to better support vulnerable and disengaged children and young people in Katherine, particularly those who experience domestic and family violence.

Our strategic objectives include:

1. Gather the views of children and young people about their needs and aspirations
2. Develop strategies to ensure that the views, needs and aspirations of children are fed into the Department of the Attorney Generals and Justice ‘Safety is Everyone’s Right’ NT Domestic and Family Violence Reduction Strategy 2014-2017,
3. Strengthen collaboration across the Katherine community to improve ways in which children and young people who experience domestic and family violence are supported

Clarifying gaps, needs and/or concerns

Information gathered through CALI community meetings & related ongoing discussions in Katherine from late 2014 and during 2015 identified the following issues could be addressed through Katherine’s Child Aware Local Initiative:

- Children and young people’s exposure to domestic violence and drug/alcohol abuse, means that they may be unsafe at home, and not have their basic needs met, such as for food and housing.
- The limited options in Katherine that address this for children and young people: e.g. suitable alternative accommodation or leisure/recreation activities.
- The current (2014) practice of school exclusion appears to have the following unintended consequences:
 - 1) an increase in the numbers of disengaged youth from education and training
 - 2) children missing out school based meals, and sport/recreation activities, and
 - 3) children learning perverse ways of managing life

- The need for more strategic collaboration within the service network to overcome the fragmented and unstable nature of Katherine's community services sector. Contributing factors: short term funding, overly prescriptive program guidelines re: client group, shortage of volunteers.

	<p>CALI is a standing agenda item on the LRG agenda which Bev reports against</p> <p>Interest/support of NT Children's Commissioner</p> <p>Other identified useful links within CALI group to key community leaders/groups</p>	<p>As a consequence of the omission, children are not formally recognised or counted as "victims" of domestic and family violence in the NT, and perpetrators cannot be charged with these offences unless the child is physically assaulted.</p> <p>Katherine CALI group holds the view that the omission discounts the impact and trauma experienced by children.</p> <p>Katherine CALI members endorse definition of a perpetrator of domestic and family violence as someone who "intentionally uses violence, threats, force or intimidation to control or manipulate a family member, partner or former partner. It is characterised by an imbalance of power whereby the perpetrator uses abusive behaviors and tactics to obtain power and control over the victim causing fear. The violence is intentional and systematic and often increases in frequency and severity the longer the relationship goes on" see, Carrington & Phillips 2003, Tually, Faulkner, Culter & Slater, 2008.)</p> <p>The CALI group holds the view, that in these situations, children are truly powerless and that it is imperative that this is recognised across all NT legislations and that all relevant "Acts," align to ensure that children are at the centre of all investigations into domestic and family violence.</p> <p>This evidence was included in a verbal submission presented to NT DV Act Reform Investigative Commission, September 2015.</p> <p>The NT 'Safety is Everyone's Right' Domestic and Family Violence Reduction Strategy 2014-2017, Implementation Plan (circulated October 2015) has identified 'strategies' and 'actions' that aim to improve safety and wellbeing for NT children and young people. The Safety is Everyone's Right strategy implementation plan has five action areas – Prevention, early intervention, protection – safety for victims and their children, rebuilding victims lives and accountability. The Katherine CALI plan fits neatly into these five areas of action which ensures that children are recognised through all stages of the strategy development and implementation.</p>
